For as scripture says: The more we have, the more we have to lose.

The more we have to lose, the more fearful we become. The more fearful we become, the more defensive we grow. The more defensive we grow, the more closed we become. And the more closed we get, the less loving we become. So that we end up with a withered heart, and God finds it difficult to breathe into a withered heart. (Habbakuk 2: 5-20!) There are two ways to be rich: one means having all we want, the other is being satisfied with what we have. Of the two, the second is preferable. The truly rich person is not one who is in possession of much, but the one who gives much. And in fact, we are rich only if we are happy. If we are happy, then we are rich. MALKERNS - SWAZILAND




