

Jorge Mario Bergoglio was born in Buenos Aires on 17 December 1936, one of five children of an Italian railway worker and a housewife from the middle-class neighbourhood of Flores. He was a typical "Porteño," as inhabitants of the port city of Buenos Aires are known, a follower of the San Lorenzo football club, with a taste for classical music and the work of Argentinian writer Jorge Luis Borges. He became a Jesuit priest at the age of 32, nearly a decade after losing a lung due to respiratory illness and abandoning his chemistry studies. Despite his late start, he was leading the local Jesuit community within four years, holding the top post from 1973 to 1979. In 1998 he was appointed archbishop of Buenos Aires. After he became archbishop of the city in 1998 he routinely turned down invitations to eat at restaurants and only left the



archbishopric for meals at small soup kitchens. On 21 February 2001, he was created and proclaimed Cardinal by Blessed John Paul II and on 13 March 2013 was elected Pope by the College of Cardinals at the hand of the Holy Spirit.






All eyes were on the chimney in Saint Peter's and cries of "The white smoke is coming out. The white smoke is coming out," rang around the world. "We have a Pope." It seemed as if the whole world was excited about this stupendous moment, which was history in the making. And then attention was turned to the window. Who was it going to be? Raindrenched people and those watching from afar, had to wait a full hour before the words:

"Habemus Papam"

with the name of Francis I, and to enormous applause, the new Pontiff stepped onto the balcony. A humble, gentle man, who seemed overwhelmed by the reaction of the crowd. "Brothers and sisters, good evening" he said. "You know the duty of the Conclave was to give a bishop to Rome. It seems as though my brother cardinals went almost to the end of the world to get him. But here I am. I thank you for your welcome. The diocesan community of Rome has a bishop. Thank you!" Then he prayed for his predecessor – Bishop Emeritus Benedict XVI while the crowd joined in.



He continued his speech with "and now let us begin this journey together as bishop and people... the journey of fraternity, love and trust. Let us always pray for one another..... and now I would like to give you my blessing. But before I do, I would like to ask you a favour. Before the bishop blesses the people, I ask you to pray to the Lord that He bless me...the prayer of the people for a blessing upon their bishop. Let us take a moment of silence for you to offer your prayer for me."

After the cacophony of sound that emanated from St Peter's Square, the silence was deafening. He then gave his blessing 'to the world and to all men and women of good will.' After which he said that he would pray tomorrow to the Madonna.

WHO IS JORGE MARIO BERGOGLIO?

The Vatican released his official biography and taken from there is a short summary: He holds a degree as a chemical technician

He taught literature and psychology at the Immacolata College in Santa Fe and at the University of El Salvador.

He has a degree in Theology and in March 1986 he went to Germany to finish his doctoral thesis.

He was Provincial for Argentina for six years.

In 1992 John Paul II appointed him titular Bishop of Auca and Auxiliary of Buenos Aires.

In 1997 he was appointed Coadjutor Archbishop of Buenos Aires. John Paul II proclaimed him Cardinal in

He was a member of:

2001.

The Congregations for Divine Worship and Discipline of the Sacraments; for the Clergy; and for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life, The Pontifical Council for the Family, and the Pontifical Commission for Latin America.







"We live in the most unequal part of the world, which has grown the most, yet reduced misery the least," he said in 2007. "The unjust distribution of good persists, creating a situation of social sin that cries out to heaven and limits the possibilities of a fuller life for so many of our brothers."

But his dedication to social justice and commitment, to alleviating poverty may now have counted in his favour — and much has been made of his humility and frugal lifestyle. Not only did he abjure the cardinal's residence in the Argentinian capital for a small apartment and reject a chauffeur-driven car to travel by bus, he also told hundreds of Argentinians not to waste their money on plane tickets to Rome to see him created a cardinal by John Paul II in 2001, urging them to give it instead to the poor. He also cooked his own meals.

"His character is in every way that of a moderate; he is absolutely capable of undertaking the necessary renovation without any leaps into the unknown," said Francesca Ambrogetti, one of his biographers. "He would be a balancing force. He shares the view that the church should have a missionary role, that gets out to meet people, that is active ... a church that does not so much regulate the faith as promote and facilitate it."



We are reminded of an old hymn which we don't seem to hear these days: 'Full in the panting heart of Rome, Beneath the Apostles' crowning dome With pilgrim's lips that kiss the ground Breathes in our hearts one only sound: God bless our Pope, God bless our Pope, God bless our Pope, the great the good.'
