Pope Francis released his message for the Fourth World Day of the Poor, observed on 15 November. The Pope calls on people to keep their gaze fixed on the poor, especially during the Covid-19 pandemic, and warns against succumbing to a "whirlwind of indifference".

The theme for the 4th World Day of the Poor is "Stretch forth your hand to the poor", taken from the book of Sirach. The Message was released on Saturday 13 June 2020, while the actual World Day is observed on 15 November 2020.

The Pope tells us that "time devoted to prayer can never become an alibi for neglecting our neighbour in need." "Generosity that supports the weak, consoles the afflicted, relieves suffering and restores dignity to those stripped of

it, is a condition for a fully human life," Pope Francis says. "The power of God's grace cannot be restrained by the selfish tendency to put ourselves always first."
In his message, the Pope acknowledges that "keeping our gaze fixed on the poor is difficult", but, he underlines, it is "more necessary than ever if we are to give proper direction to our personal life and the life of society."

Concluding his message, the Pope recalls that in the book of Sirach it is written, 'In everything you do, remember your end'. He continues by saying, "the 'end' of all our actions can only be love. This is the ultimate goal of our journey, and nothing should distract us from it."

Even a smile, remarks Pope Francis, is something we can share with the poor and is a "source of love and a way of spreading love. An outstretched hand, then, can always be enriched by the smile of those who quietly and unassumingly offer to help, inspired only by the joy of living as one of Christ's disciples." *Vatican Media*

AMEN -St. Augustine In his homily, on the Feast of Corpus Christi, Pope Francis reflected on the importance of remembering God's many gifts.

"Without memory, we uproot ourselves from the soil that nourishes us and allow ourselves to be carried away like leaves in the wind." The Pope said the act of remembering helps us rebuild our strongest connections and makes us feel part of a larger story. "Memory is not

something private; it is the path that unites us to God and to others," he said. The Bible, he added, recounts how our

relationship with the Lord is transmitted from generation to generation by word of mouth.

But, what happens, asked Pope Francis when the chain of transmission of memories is broken?

God, he replied, knows how short our memories can be. Because of this "He left us a memorial," which goes far beyond words or signs. "*He gave us Food, for it is not easy to forget something we have actually tasted. He left us Bread in which He is truly present, alive and true, with all the flavour of His love.*" The Eucharist, he



said, is no mere memory, it is a fact. "In Holy Mass, the death and resurrection of Jesus are set before us."

LOCKDOWN OUTREACH FOLLOW UP OF THE SALESIAN FAMILY - ENNERDALE

Our sincere thank you to the wonderful people who responded so generously to our 'outreach' for food for the vulnerable. An exceedingly kind family assisted us to transport the food parcels after the shopping was done. There was a 'special' for 10kg Mielie meal, 10kg rice, 10kg flour and 2Lt cooking oil. We decided to give the parcels to the people as soon as was possible, as they were in desperate need. The families were contacted to inform them to come to the school with their children who attend Laura Vicuna, to collect a parcel of food. By the time we arrived at the school, the large crowd of people were standing in lines on the open land, across from Don Bosco Educational Projects. They had arrived early in the morning and were anxious to receive help. The necessary screening was done as they entered the Centre and they were divided into the classes of the children. When they arrived at the classroom and saw what they were going to receive, they were amazed. There were tears of joy in their eyes and their faces



sparkled with relief. They could not thank us enough for the food supplies. They even danced with joy. They have sent messages to say how much they appreciate this tremendous help and that they could now feed their families for



a while. Their gratitude was great. Some came with a pram and some with a wheelbarrow. Others carried the parcels, on their heads or by hand. The children from the Sancta Maria Pre School received something when we celebrated the feast of Mary Help of Christians. Over 350 parcels were given out.

We have been promised more help for food parcels, that will be distributed at a later stage. We thank God for the great response we received and pray for the generous donors who have given so much to touch the hearts of the most vulnerable. What a joy it is for them to now have a meal, due to the kindness of those who have made it possible. There are no words to express our gratitude, on behalf of the poorest of the poor. *Sister*

A FIRE - AND THE OTTERY CHAPEL – 30 YEARS OLD

Reggie Sauer and his family were responsible, 30 years ago, for what has now become the Ottery Chapel. He recently had a fire at his home in Lansdowne, which he tells us about, followed by a brief summary of the existence of the Ottery Chapel. The fire was caused by an electrical fault on the second floor (attic), I was on the same floor at the time when I smelt smoke, and called my wife on the floor below, to check its origin. But she could not smell any smoke. I immediately thereafter went back to the attic and just saw flames. I tried to dowse them with buckets of water but to no avail. The fire brigade was summoned, and the fire was eventually extinguished.

We are blessed to be alive especially with the disaster taking place at 9am and not in the early hours of the morning while we were all asleep. We are eternally grateful to GOD our Almighty Father. We are further blessed that there were no fatalities, except for a nephew's scorched arm.



It gives me great pleasure, and on behalf of my family, the Sauer family, to reflect briefly on the past 30 years of Ottery chapel's existence. Prior to the birth of Ottery chapel, the late Fr Martin Daly said Holy Mass in a "garage" to accommodate those parishioners who relied on public transport to get to our mother church in Lansdowne.

Many of you will no doubt recall that Fr Daly's only transport was his bicycle which he used to get to Mass and do his visitations, assisted by the late George Virgin. When we heard of this, we approached Fr Daly

and the rest of the clergy, and offered them one of the two vacant spaces in our building. They chose the very one where we still are today.

We were faced with many challenges from outside forces threatening to shut down the chapel but we persisted and persevered with the full conviction that "if God is on your side, who can ever be against you."

The Chapel started off with only 25 parishioners. The then parish priest was the late Fr Canice Dooley. In a short space of time the word rapidly spread about the chapel's existence and soon the first part of the chapel was fast filling up so much so that we had to extend the floor area to accommodate the growing congregation. 
Linked to these two friends is another good lady, who is the Co-Ordinator of the Care Group in

Covid - 19 has altered the way in which the world has viewed itself and significant adjustments have been made by all especially at Parish level. No one could have foreseen, or desired, the sudden disruption to life and the tragedies which have been suffered by so many of our Brothers and Sisters across the Globe. However, when our back is against the wall, new situations always bring fresh opportunities, and our



Christian Faith assures us that God's imagination will never be exhausted. Many wonderful initiatives and resources have come available including Live -Streaming of the Masses. The hunger for the things of God is very real; many feel that there is a dimension missing from their lives which can only be answered by a Faith Commitment. **St. Peter tells us: "Reverence the Lord Jesus in your hearts, and always have your answer ready for the people who ask you for the hope you have".**

Following the State President's address on the 26th May 2020, the Archdiocese of Johannesburg issued a directive clarifying measures to be put into place to ensure the safety of the Parishioners, the Priests as well as the community at large. Not to re-open until further notice. We will continue to monitor the situation monthly. The Feast of Corpus Christi would have seen our First Communion Candidates encounter Jesus in a very special way as they received him in their very being. Those Adults who had been preparing for Fuller Communion with the Church at Easter are still awaiting their sacraments. This Year's Cohort of teenagers receiving Confirmation in July will unfortunately be put on hold. Added to that are the number of Babies for Baptism. The Elderly and the Housebound for whom pastoral care in their homes have also been compromised in a big way. Couples who had planned their Weddings have had to reschedule their dates. We are aware too that this is challenging for our faithful Parishioners who are all this time without receiving Communion.

We can only **Hope and Pray** that the frustration engendered by the current situation will have increased peoples longing for the things of God, and the old saying: **"Absence makes the Heart grow fonde**r." *Father Tim Wrenn*

I did Nursing before entering the Convent in Brosna where I had 3 cousins who were Salesian Sisters. I experienced the warm friendliness of the Sisters there and was attracted to the Don Bosco spirit.

I came as a Sister to South Africa in 1965 and from Johannesburg I proceeded by plane to Cape Town. Looking out of the window in the plane I could see neither houses, nor people. Strange? I learned later that the plane was flying over the Great Karoo.

I worked in the Nursery School at Booysens and also in Delft, on the Cape Flats. It was a joy to teach the children of alll ages: Cathechism, RCIA, prayer groups and family visiting in Kuils River, filled my days.

The complex manager, Gwen came too - she phoned a plumber, Bennett. R850.00 later and the pipe was replaced. She also told me about Ernst, who owns Clicks Clean, a resident in the village. Fortunately, he was at home when I

knocked on his door. He came and assessed the damage and fetched his industrial water vacuum cleaner. He worked in my bedroom and some of the other rooms. He would not charge me, so once things are more back to normal his team will come and clean my lounge furniture and charge me for that. The furniture did not get wet, it is just in need of a cleaning. **Within** two hours or so the water had been mopped up. Steve, Debbie and Gwen did an amazing job sweeping water out of the two



external doors with brooms, squeegee and mop. **After** having no news for so long I had a news- worthy story to share. I chatted and laughed about it with Natz, and some of my sisters. Imagine if I had been at work and returned to that disaster?

The laminate flooring is a bit the worse for the water cleaning it underwent, but besides that all is well. **Looking** back on this from nearly a month on – it was not as bad as it felt at the time! **GAIL WILES**

THE FOLLOWING STORY is

from a lady whom I spoke to 16 years ago. I telephoned her to ask about the renewal date on her credit card. Her response to my request was CAUTION personified. "How do I know who you are," she said. I appreciated her caution and told her so, but she still was not convinced. I offered to send her a copy of my ID and a letterhead from

Salesians, which I duly did the following morning. I 'phoned her again and we talked. She had lost her husband in a tragic robbery just a few months earlier and hence her caution. Both her sons left the country as a result. I am happy to say that she trusted me after that, and we have become good friends. She prefers to remain anonymous and so this story is from A GOOD FRIEND.

"I went overseas on 18th December 2019 to see the Boys and their Girls. It was a total surprise for Raine, (youngest) as he was turning 30 on Christmas Eve. This was our first Christmas that we have all been together in 16 years! Far too long and, after having been invited for the surprise birthday, I thought why not and stopped with the excuses and just booked a ticket. I also went up to Scotland to visit a friend/ex neighbours Joe and Ellen Gilmartin. Ellen had an uncle who was a priest and, once retired, stayed at Nazareth House in Yeoville.

I needed to see them as they lost their youngest son Matthew aged 38 in June 2019, he died peacefully in his sleep and that was a year after he had a series of about 7 heart attacks (June 2018). Matthew was the youngest of 5 children and was only 3 when we moved into our home here and the Gilmartin's stayed only about 8 doors away. I so enjoyed my time with them. They are now 80 and 78, respectively. I was determined to do the trip as they were there for me when our tragedy struck, and they are just such a lovely family.

I had Christmas and New Year with the boys plus their girlfriends, extended family, and friends. I flew home on 11th January 2020 and that was very sad, but I was happy that I went and have seen how nicely they have got on with their lives. They are men now; Grant having turned 35.

I am in regular contact with Allan's Mom (my Mother-in-law) and she turns 100 on 6th August 2020. She is very fit and very with it, she tells them all to walk up straight in the retirement home. She is in Pinetown at The Village and her oldest son is not too far from her, Cowies Hill. The youngest son, Ian, is in Oxford, UK.

Well Denise, it is very cold in this bedroom and I must still do my French lesson. You must come round for coffee when lockdown is over."

records with perfection. Father John has taken a few knocks health wise, but he has survived them all.




